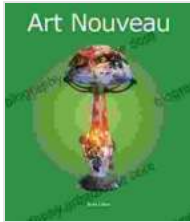

Art Nouveau was a major art movement that had a significant impact on the development of modern art. Its organic forms and vibrant colors continue to inspire artists today.





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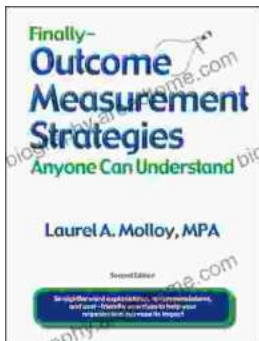
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
